We must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of Physical Education, Sport and Physical Activity (PESPA) on offer to pupils.

This means we will use the premium to:

- 1. To develop or add to the PeSSPA already in place in school (referring to the aims below)
- 2. To make improvements now for future pupils

The 5 key indicators where improvements should be seen are:

- 1. The engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity, aiming for 30 minutes a day within school time.
- 2. The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole school improvement.
- 3. Increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
- 4. Broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils.
- 5. Increased participation in competitive sport.

The National Curriculum aims are for all children:

- To be physically active, working towards a target of 30 minutes activity during and after the school day (excluding general play times)
- To excel in a broad range of activities
- To engage in competition
- To lead healthy lifestyles

At St James' & Ebrington we used the funding allocated in 2022/23 (£17, 235) and additional funds from our budget so it had maximum impact on all pupils. We provided:

- A more inclusive curriculum which educates all children on the benefits of physical activity through physical education and the promotion of an active outdoor learning environment.
- Increased the profile of physical activity throughout the school ethos and culture.
- Upskilled teachers to feel confident in delivering high quality teaching of PE from Reception to Year 6.
- Helped develop children's emotional, social and physical wellbeing, and confidence in a range of physical activities (both competitive and non-competitive sports)

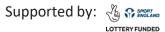
